

DAVID M. ENGLISH is the W. F. Fratcher Professor of Law & E. L. Jenkins Professor of Law at the University of Missouri. Professor English is best known for his work for the Uniform Law Commission. He was the Reporter (principal drafter) for the 2000 Uniform Trust Code, the 1993 Uniform Health-Care Decisions Act, and the 2007 Uniform Adult Guardianship and Protective Proceedings Jurisdiction Act. He also chaired the drafting committee for the 2017 Uniform Guardianship, Conservatorship and Other Protective Arrangements Act.

Professor English has been very active in the American Bar Association. He is a past Chair of the ABA Section of Real Property Trust and Estate Law, a past Chair of the ABA Commission on Law and Aging and was formerly Co-Chair of the National Conference of Lawyers and Corporate Fiduciaries. He has been particularly active on issues related to guardianship and served as Chair of the National Guardianship Network from 2021-2023.

In addition to numerous law review and professional articles, Professor English is co-author of the treatises *Wills, Trusts, and Estates*, and *Wills, Trusts, and Estates Concise Edition* published by West Academic, co-author of *Tax, Estate and Financial Planning for the Elderly,* and *Tax, Estate and Financial Planning for the Elderly,* published by Lexis, and *co-author of Fiduciary Accounting and Trust Administration Guide*, published by ALI-ABA.

In addition to his activities in the US, Professor English has made over a dozen trips to East Asia to speak, teach, and advise on trust law, guardianship, and other elder law issues. These activities include serving as a consultant on the drafting of the 2000 Chinese Trust Law and teaching at the University of Tokyo as a Fulbright Visiting Professor.

Prior to entering law teaching, Professor English was a partner in the Chicago Law firm of D'Ancona & Pflaum. He received his B.A. from Duke University and his J.D from Northwestern University. In his off hours, Professor English serves as an organist at a local Lutheran church.
